He Chose the Nails

"He Chose the Nails" will be our Lenten study this year. The study is based on a book by Max Lucado of the same name. It will be a 5 -week study. Ash Wednesday this year is Wednesday, March 2, 2022. The study will begin the following Wednesday, March 9, and will continue through Wednesday, April 6.


Purchasing a book is not required. But should you want to read Max Lucado's book for yourself during Lent, you can find it here:

Jubilee Christmas Gratitude

Another year of adjusting to how a pandemic can affect the ministry of Jubilee, every roadblock, frustration and major or slight change can lead us to joy and delight. Eighteen families, English speaking, Burmese and Hispanic, and over 60 children have had the opportunity to experience God's love through your generosity and care.

At the end of Jubilee Day, December 11, parents or guardians wrapped toys and gifts with their hosts and many willing additional hands. Some families picked up their gifts to wrap at home and some of our church hosts delivered the gifts when transportation was an issue.

Families received blankets for each of their children, made by several members of our church. Pillows, coats, hats, gloves, and undies were part of a family's Christmas. Parents shared with their host the particular needs of their family and because of your donations to the Jubilee Fund, we could provide so much of what was essential.

Our Cookie Bakers went above and beyond in bringing homemade cookies so that every family took home three or more dozen delicious cookies. A Christmas card from the church family included a generous gift card for any additional food or shopping the families had.

Jubilee planning begins after the first of the year and continues through the months with full steam ahead in September. The wonderful Homecroft staff which includes a social worker and two interpreters, recommends families to be matched with hosts from the church. However this is a whole church effort.

Food Pantry

Southport Church supports the Hunger, INC pantry located on 1416 E. Epler Avenue. Thanks to the money donations in 2021, a \$25 gift card to ALDI's was given to each client in the Perry Township area in

November/December. All clients were so thankful for the gift to make either Thanksgiving or Christmas bountiful. Thank you for your support to the pantry.

Food donations may be made during open hours and other days by placing your items in the drop box on the front porch.

We will be collecting the following for January 2nd-6th: CRACKERS, LAUNDRY AND DISH SOAP, DIAPERS AND WIPES.

The shoppers for the pantry have had a tough time finding saltine crackers, so there is a real need for this item. The soaps can be purchased at the Dollar Tree as well as diapers and wipes. These items are requested most often at the pantry days. The panty is open on Tuesday 10-1, Thursday 4-7 and Saturday 10-1. Thank you for your support in money and items.

WHAT IF

I have been the financial officer of SUMC for a little over five years now. When I first started this position, as you can imagine, one of the first things I did was review our financial position. What I saw wasn't all that bad, but certainly there was some work to do. One of the biggest concerns I identified was the amount of debt we had compared to how well we were positioned to pay it back. We had \$1.3 million in debt. Now the debt was structured well, it was (and still is) in a term loan with a reasonable rate. So, that meant it would be paid off by the year 2043. The problem was that it would cost us over \$1.5 million in interest to pay it off this way.

In those five years I have seen our financial health change dramatically. I have seen that \$1.3million in debt shrink to only \$560,000. With another \$276,000 already pledged. Plus, we have \$45,000 in reserve to ensure we never miss a payment. We have already saved 100s of thousands of dollars in interest and trimmed over a decade off the term of our debt.

In addition to the \$740,000 in debt I've seen eliminated, I have seen our emergency funds double (still need to work on this though), and I have watched our current liquid assets increase to 2.25 times what they were five years ago.

You have done this by giving generously and being good stewards. Furthermore, you have done this while still actively impacting our community through a variety of ministries and missions that share God's hope and grace through your time, talent, and resources. What is it that Pastor Duane says? "This is the most serving church he's ever seen, per capita." Per capita sounds more like something I'd say, but I certainly echo an amazement for the generosity of the people of Southport UMC and their enthusiasm to do good work.

Now is the time that I must tell you, we aren't quite their yet. We still have a bit to go to eliminate our debt by our 175th anniversary. Roughly \$270,000 to go to be more precise.

The expression comes to mind, "it's time to put some skin in the game." But that expression always makes me think of getting blisters

on my hands. Every spring I have this problem when I begin to garden. The tools tend to leave my hands raw, often with chunks of skin ripping off. Thankfully my daughter got me a Christmas present this year to help with this problem. Work gloves! I'm usually too hardheaded to wear them but bet I will this year since they are from her. But something I've noticed is that when you put skin in the game by working your hands raw it tends to slow you down in the future. If you wear work gloves it doesn't seam to have this effect. In fact, it often allows you to work faster. So, I propose we don't put skin in the game, but instead each of us put on our work gloves.



I am thankful for all that you have done to bring us so close to our goal in only eight months. We


still have 34 months until our 175th anniversary. What can we do in that time to finish this task in a way that frees us to use our resources to increase our ministry, outreach, and presence in this community?

Join me in putting on our work gloves to eliminate our debt and position ourselves to grow in new and innovative ways and to spread grace and hope for generations to come.

If we never made additional principal payments we would still have a debt of \$1,187,787.91 and we would be "on the hook" for \$936,109 in interest to pay off our mortgage by 2043.

Because of the What If campaign and other principal only payments we currently only have \$578,297 in debt. If we do not pay another penny in additional payments it will only cost us \$131,477 in interest to have our debt paid off by 2029.

W have \$45,000 in the bank & about \$275,000 in pledges to go to principal in the near future.

Finance

In the sixth chapter of John's gospel, the story is shared of 5,000 hungry people who were fed by a boy's loaves and fishes. There is a bible

commentary in which the author describes this as a miracle, but not in the way we usually think of one. He thought, since people

carried food bags with them in those times (much as we might take lunch with us today), there was plenty of food available. The problem was that nobody wanted to share. Perhaps they felt the same way as the disciples—there were too many hungry people to feed, and they thought they didn't have enough. Certainly, it is easy to feel this way about our resources. However, when we all choose to share and work together their will be enough, with leftovers to boot.

This year the people of SUMC have been generous with their loaves and fishes. We provided many people with rent and utility assistance through the Pastor's Benevolent fund. We provided food through the Harvest Table, food drives, and people serving at Hunger Inc. We gave nourishment to the homeless through resources prepared and

given through Feed a Need. We financially supported Interfaith Hospitality Network to provide warm beds for people that may otherwise not have them. On a moment's notice, we collected several carloads of diapers, clothes, and other resources for the Afghan refugees. We provided Christmas, including gifts, clothes, and gift cards to 18 families through Jubilee Christmas. And most recently, we gave our entire Christmas Eve offering of over \$3,500 to UMCOR to support relief for the victims of the tornadoes. And these are just a few of the ways your gifts have reached out into the community and the world to bring hope this year.

We did all the above this year and still managed to reduce our debt by over \$280,000 through your generosity to the What If campaign. This will help us bring hope and grace for years to come.

Oh, and there are leftovers. We almost certainly will end the year with a surplus. The surplus will most likely be used for facilities maintenance to minimize the risk of unexpected expenses (example: leaky roofs or broken ACs) in the coming years or put to our debt to help with the What If campaign.

Now, back to the boy and his loaves and fishes. I believe Jesus has the power to feed five thousand with only five loaves and two fishes, but I also believe the act of generosity, combined with Christ's blessing, could have opened thousands of food bags—proving more than enough for everyone. Regardless of which way it happened, it was a miracle.

Either way, the key was the boy. He believed in Jesus and His ability to provide. While everyone cowered and calculated, the boy brought what he had. I can only imagine the wide smile on Jesus' face when he took the boy's lunch. Whether Jesus multiplied it as we think, or whether the gift was a catalyst for more giving, I imagine there were a lot of people who went to bed that night thinking about that boy. A little child, indeed, had led them.

Thank you for bringing what you have. And trusting that Jesus will use it for His purpose. Give it to Christ as a blessing. Then feast on the miracle. This is the gospel we believe, and the gospel we share. Let us continue to be His body in our community and the world.
