# A Matter of Perspective

In one of my favorite movies, *Big Hero 6*, there's a scene where Hiro feels stuck—he just can't see a way forward. That's when his older brother, Tadashi, lifts him up and tells him to look at things from a different angle. From that new perspective, what once looked like a jumble of pieces suddenly makes sense. The problem hasn't changed, but Hiro's frame has—and that makes all the difference.

Faith often works the same way. Our perspective shapes how we see the world, and sometimes all we need is a shift in frame. Have you ever stood before one of those sculptures that looks like twisted metal from one angle, but when you step a few feet to the side it reveals a face or even a cross? The sculpture itself hasn't changed—only your point of view.

The Apostle Paul reminds us of this truth in **2 Corinthians 5:7: "We walk by faith**, **not by sight."** Life doesn't always make sense when viewed through our own limited lens. But when we allow God to reframe our perspective, we begin to see things more clearly. Worship becomes more than routine—it becomes an encounter with God's presence. Scripture is no longer just words on a page—it becomes the living Word shaping us. Even our daily work, relationships, and challenges begin to look different when seen through the frame of faith.

The beauty of following Jesus is that life takes on new meaning when viewed through God's perspective. What once felt ordinary can reveal the holy. What once felt like a dead end can open into new beginnings. And what once seemed impossible can, in Christ, become possible.

This September, I invite you to let God lift you up, just as Tadashi lifted Hiro, and allow faith to shift your frame. Sometimes what feels confusing or overwhelming can become breathtakingly beautiful when we look at it from God's perspective.



SEPTEMBER DONATIONS needed ARE: Canned beans: Pork and Beans, kidney beans, chili beans, refried beans and black beans.


Dates: September 3rd ---September 14th. All donations may be placed in the grocery basket next to the Coat Hallway.

But, remember it is important to continue your regular giving. If you can't do both, no worries. We understand. And the good news is someone else is in a season that they can give more.
